Native Plant Society of Texas Chapters

When you join the **Native Plant Society of Texas**, you become part of a statewide organization with over 2300 members. Most members also choose to join one of our chapters, at no additional cost. These chapters provide educational programs and activities on native Texas plants and related topics that are specific to their area of the state.

We encourage you to join a chapter. When you do, a portion of your dues is sent to the chapter to help cover expenses. If you don't live near a chapter or for any reason do not want to join a chapter, you may choose to become a member-at-large. All members, regardless of chapter affiliation, receive the quarterly newsletter.

New members will receive a membership packet in the mail within thirty days of joining.
